Did you graduate from high school but your marks did not quite meet the University of Saskatchewan entrance requirements?

The Transition Program may be just what you need!

The University of Saskatchewan Transition Program is delivered through the College of Arts and Science.

The Transition Program provides a supportive closeknit learning environment that helps students to make the jump from high school to university.

Students register in a Learning Community with a maximum of 18 credit units of courses, and work closely with Academic Coaches and Peer Mentors.

All courses in the Learning Community can be used towards an Arts and Science degree.

Students in the Transition Program have access to on-campus sports facilities, libraries, computer labs, math and writing help, Indigenous student services, access and equity services, student employment services, health and wellness services and academic advisors.

Who Should Apply?

Students under the age of 21 whose high school average is between 60% and 69%.
