ISAP students are eligible to apply for start-of-term textbook bursaries (valued at \$300) and Peter Stoicheff ISAP First Year Achievement Scholarships (nine awards valued at \$1,500).

to \$40,000, which are awarded based on academics, leadership and contributions to school and community life. Another featured award is the **Indigenous Students with Dependent Children Bursary**, which is awarded to all eligible applicants.

The Gordon Oakes Red Bear Student Centre is dedicated to supporting the personal, social, cultural, and academic success of Métis, First Nations and Inuit students. The centre is
